Councillor Blog

Welcome back fellow residents of White City (and those reading from the surrounding area) for the March 2024 edition of the White City Councillor Blog. This month's blog will focus on providing an update on our Community Safety Officer (CSO) program and answering some frequently asked questions.



We have a few exciting updates about our ongoing efforts to improve community safety through the innovative Community Safety Officer (CSO) program. Firstly, I'd like to extend a warm welcome to Keagan Jacksteit, our newly trained CSO. You might see Keagan patrolling our streets in the marked truck or cycling along our pathways on the CSO bike. If you come across him, please take a moment to say hello and make him feel at home!

Let's delve into the key aspects of the CSO program by addressing some common questions that you may be wondering about.

- What is a CSO, and are they Police Officers?
 A CSO serves as the primary Bylaw Enforcement Officer for White City, replacing the Corps of
 Commissionaires. While they're not police officers, CSOs deliver low-risk community safety services,
 such as enforcing municipal bylaws and specific provincial acts.
- 2. What is the CSO's Mandate for White City? The CSO Program aims to enforce municipal bylaws and provincial acts, contributing to the overall community safety and reducing the workload on our valued White Butte RCMP Detachment. Beyond enforcement, the program emphasizes proactive policing through public education, engaging with local stakeholders, and fostering compliance with bylaws.
- 3. Was the CSO program designed to generate revenue?

 No, the driving force behind developing the CSO program was to establish reliable and responsive bylaw enforcement services, enhance community safety, and provide the Town with an additional and dedicated uniformed presence.

4. What does a typical patrol look like for the CSO? A CSO's routine patrol involves multiple vehicle passes through the community, coordinating with administration on bylaw enforcement, responding to service calls, conducting school zone patrols, engaging with residents, and keeping a vigilant eye out for any bylaw or provincial infractions.



- 5. Why is the CSO sitting in a certain area? CSOs may monitor specific areas where issues have been identified or when residents express concerns. This proactive approach ensures a swift response to community needs, addressing potential problems and maintaining a safer environment.
- 6. Why don't the Town and the RM share CSO services?

 Before the CSO program, the Town originally explored the option of contracting CSO services from the RM of Edenwold. It was determined that it would not be the most cost-effective method of delivering the required services within the Town.

At the time this was first explored contracted services were explored, the cost of contracting the RM of Edenwold CSOs was \$140/hr. If the Town contracted 12 hours per week of service, the approximate cost today would be \$97.3K. By implementing our own program, the service costs approximately \$90/hr which includes officer wages, benefits, training, uniform, equipment, fuel, vehicle maintenance, insurance, dispatch services and vehicle amortization (replacement costs).

7. When does the CSO patrol in White City?
The CSO's patrol times and dates vary to adapt to events and activities within the Town. This includes daytime, evening, and weekend shifts, offering a uniformed presence tailored specifically to the community's needs.

Our CSO program is a multifaceted initiative focused on promoting community safety, education, and proactive policing. Let's continue working together to make White City an even safer and more welcoming place for everyone.



Council Summaries

February 5, 2024 - Committee of the Whole

The meeting began with a presentation by St/Sgt Niedzielski from the White Butte RCMP Detachment, providing an overview of RCMP activities from September 2023 to January 2024. Following this, the Consent Agenda included minutes, accounts, and correspondence, with discussions around a Construction Standards Appeal Board Hearing related to a property not meeting National Building Code requirements. The Administration Report highlighted plans for including fat tire biking in the upcoming Chillfest, while the Governance and Legislative Services Activity Report discussed collaborations with local schools, communications methods, and the White City inSight Newsletter. The Committee also addressed a donation request for a local softball team, public works projects and repairs, and explored potential recreation opportunities such as skating paths.

February 5, 2024 - Regular Council Meeting

The Consent Agenda, including minutes and accounts, was approved after addressing a question about a cheque related to water analysis for the utility rate review. The Town Manager provided an update on boundary alteration, wastewater authority, and planning and community development, which was accepted without further questions. Discussions on Tax Enforcement led to the referral of the item back to administration for an updated list with civic addresses. The approval of a Loader Tender focused on the net financial benefit, operational advantages, and the sale of old equipment covering the cost of the new unit. The appointment of a fundraising committee for the Multi-Use Recreation Centre involved requesting criminal record checks. Long Term Borrowing Bylaw discussions covered aspects like application to the Saskatchewan Municipal Board, the town's debt limit, and potential payment methods if no development occurs. The meeting also reviewed various items, including the Total Compensation Review, WCRM158 Wastewater Management Authority Operational Funding Request, 2024 SUMA Voting Delegates, and Fee Bylaw Amendment, all of which were approved. The Roundtable discussion included updates on the White City Museum, Emergency Measures Organizations, Youth Advisory Committee, Johnson Shoyama Graduate Studies Course, Lions Club Blitz, and a Tyler Smith Virtual Event.

January 20, 2024 - Committee of the Whole

The Town of White City Committee of the Whole Meeting met on February 20, 2024 Highlights from the meeting include a comprehensive update from the White City Museum, outlining plans for the Eco Museum, funding strategies, and future expansion initiatives. The meeting also covered routine items such as the Consent Agenda and sponsorship requests, with approval granted for the Greenall Graduation Parent Committee's sponsorship application. Strategic planning discussions focused on budget implications, collaborative review sessions, and qualitative data integration. Additionally, reports on community planning and development activities, upcoming Chillfest details, and updates on fire services mutual aid agreements were presented. Councillors also shared insights on various topics during the Roundtable session, ranging from RCMP stakeholder meetings to upcoming events. The meeting concluded with a closed session to discuss a funding request and confidential project proposal, with resolutions passed to recommend funding approval and proceed with the proposed project.

Goodbye Plastic, Hello Paper

Starting this spring, we will no longer accepting leaves in plastic bags during Spring and Fall Clean–Up. Bags made of paper will be the only material accepted by Public Works crews when collection time begins in May. Any other material including those labelled as biodegradable and compostable will not be collected.

In past years, Public Works Summer Students have spent countless hours each season ripping open plastic bags for the leaves to be properly disposed of. Paper leaf bags will immensely simplify the



clean-up process and allow our hard-working Summer Students to use their time serving the community in other ways.

May 13th seems like a long time away, but we want to ensure you have plenty of time to stock up on paper bags before you begin your spring clean-up. Paper yard waste bags can be purchased at most hardware and department stores such as Walmart, Superstore, Canadian Tire or Costco. To keep things local, we recommend you check the stock at Home Hardware in Emerald Park first!
