A Lottery Home Comes to Emerald Park

By the time you read this, ticket sales for the **Hospitals of Regina Foundation Home Lottery** show home located at 1 Huber Bay in Emerald Park will be well underway. Built by **Ripplinger Homes**, the home places **Emerald Park** in the spotlight while supporting a cause that benefits families across southern Saskatchewan.

The Hospitals of Regina Foundation was founded in 1987 when three local hospital leaders, Royce Gill of Regina General Hospital, Harvey Fox of Pasqua Hospital, and Gren Smith Windsor of the Wascana Rehabilitation Centre came together with a shared goal of supporting much needed hospital equipment and services in support of health care in southern Saskatchewan.

Twice every year, tickets go on sale for the HRF Home Lottery, offering participants the chance to win significant prizes while knowing their purchase supports local health care. Proceeds from the lottery help fund essential programs and services across Regina's hospitals, including pediatric and maternal care, neonatal intensive care, cardiac and surgical services, medical imaging, and cancer care.

The centrepiece of the lottery is the Grand Prize Show home, a custom built and fully furnished home often valued well over one million dollars and paired with a substantial cash prize. Each show home showcases the craftsmanship of local builders and highlights modern design and innovation.

The decision to locate this year's show home in Emerald Park was driven by a mix of practical considerations and the area's strong appeal. Limited land availability within Regina prompted the builder to look just beyond the city, where Emerald Park quickly emerged as a top choice.

"Emerald Park is a beautiful area", a representative from Ripplinger Homes shared. "The lots are spacious, the location is excellent, and the proximity to the city makes it very desirable. The nearby golf course was also a valuable feature".

While other locations were considered, higher lot prices and concerns around long term resale value ultimately narrowed the decision to Emerald Park. There is strong

confidence that a home in Emerald Park would be easier for a lottery winner to sell successfully if they choose to do so, compared to more rural or acreage style properties.

This year's show home is the most valuable grand prize ever! The home has an approximate retail value of **\$1,850,000** within a development by **Ben Kuzmicz of Great Plains Leaseholds** of Emerald Park, a well-respected developer with a long-standing presence in the area. Ripplinger Homes cited its established working relationship with Great Plains Leaseholds as a contributing factor in selecting this location.

Public viewing of the lottery home is expected to begin February 12, giving

residents and visitors the opportunity to tour the property and see the design firsthand. Tickets can be purchased online at www.hrfhomelottery.com, with the official draw date announced closer to the end of April, depending on when ticket sales sell out. I am not entirely sure how much the traffic flows will increase during the home viewing. However, some homeowners in that area may be inconvenienced for a short period.

With all lots in Emerald Park owned by Great Plains Leaseholds currently sold out, the eventual winner of this year's home lottery will be especially fortunate. Ben Kuzmicz, owner of Great Plains Leaseholds, notes that demand in Emerald Park continues to be strong for single family homes, and

confirms that additional lots along Emerald Park Road are planned to open in the near future. The continued interest reflects the community's appeal and the confidence developers have in Emerald Park as a desirable place to live and invest.

I may be biased because I love Emerald Park and truly believe it is one of the best places to live in the province. From what I am hearing locally, the project is being welcomed enthusiastically, with many residents viewing it as a positive addition to the community. I still remember when my friend's dad won the HRF Home Lottery when we were young. We stayed in the house over New Year's and a few weekends before it was sold. It was a lot of fun and a big adventure at

the time, especially since we were still pretty young. I'm sure we all know someone who has won some sort of prize over the years.

Good luck to everyone who has purchased a ticket. Whether it's a cash prize, an early bird win, or the grand prize show home in Division 3 Emerald Park, it is exciting to see our community part of something so special.

Dark Chocolate Avocado Truffles with Maple Sea Salt

Prep time: 20 minutes (plus 30 min chill time)
Makes: 12 to 16 truffles

Ingredients:

1 ripe avocado from Mexico
¾ cup (175 grams) dark chocolate, melted
2 to 3 tbsps (30-45 ml) maple syrup
1 tsp (5 ml) vanilla extract
Pinch of sea salt, plus more for sprinkling
2 tbsps (30 ml) cocoa powder for rolling
Optional coatings: matcha powder, chopped nuts, shredded coconut

Directions:

1. Prepare the avocado

Halve and pit the avocados. Scoop the flesh into a bowl and mash until completely smooth, or blend for an extra silky texture.

2. Mix the chocolate base

Stir the melted dark chocolate into the avocado. Add maple syrup, vanilla and a pinch of sea salt. Mix until fully combined and glossy.

3. Chill the mixture

Cover and refrigerate for about 30 minutes, or until firm enough to scoop.

4. Shape the truffles

Using a small spoon, scoop portions of the chilled mixture and roll into balls with your hands.



5. Coat and finish

Roll each truffle in cocoa powder, matcha powder or chopped nuts. Add a light sprinkle of sea salt on top if desired. Keep refrigerated until ready to serve.

Tips:

- Use high-quality dark chocolate for deeper flavour and more antioxidants
- For a dairy-free option, ensure the chocolate contains no milk ingredients



Make the leap to smart home appliances.



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

how to reduce the R.M.'s risk.

As it turned out, policies were not in place by the time - July 29, 2025 - an unknown scammer through, I guess, the miracle of the internet, managed to move a big chunk of change from the R.M. bank account to the scammer's bank account.

Responses from administration to councillor Posehn's emails were, shall we say, fewer in number than Posehn's warnings and seem to indicate a lesser appreciation of the risks and a lesser sense of urgency. We can only speculate why that was, but it is useful to remember that it was only a few months before councillor Posehn's first warning email that R.M. staffers were busily compiling a secret dossier on what they considered to be her shortcomings.

And what were some of those shortcomings? How about asking to amend a council meeting agenda, (something that is now routine), disrespecting the Reeve in not abiding by his instructions not to post on social media (as though Canada's Charter of Rights and Freedoms and a go-ahead from Saskatchewan's Ombudsman didn't exist), and my personal favourite, "lingering" at the coffee machine in order to supposedly eavesdrop on what some others were saying.

Not the least of her transgressions seems to have been her opposition to "granny suites" and high-density rental apartments in Emerald Park, an opinion shared by, oh, perhaps 98 percent of Emerald Park residents.

Cheerleaders for the witch-hunt against Posehn will point to the bloodbath that

occurred at the infamous council meeting of September 24, 2024. "Bloodbath" must be taken with at least a pound and a half of salt. I know. I was there, and with my trusty audio recorder switched to "On", (and which no-one seems to have been interested in listening to.)

Coming back to the scam, in their defence the R.M. has said "this fraud incident was isolated and targeted and did not involve any breach of internal municipal systems," whatever that means. The fact remains, however, that the fraud happened, and if things are fixed now, which we hope, why weren't they fixed

sooner? No one can say that they weren't warned. At the very least if Posehn's warnings had been taken seriously there might have been insurance in place to cover the loss.

One could be forgiven for concluding that, for some unfathomable reason, there has been a demonstrated animus toward councillor Posehn from the time she first came onto Council, which might account for a reduced sense of urgency for, as we now know, her legitimate IT security concerns.

There are two components to the story set out in this column. The first, as everyone knows by now, is that the R.M. of Edenwold and the Town of White City were scammed out of a lot of money on the basis of a fake capital call from the jointly-owned Waste Water Authority. Some of the money has been recovered, some hasn't.

People are scammed all the time. Heck, I once bought a cream separator from a door-to-door salesman. The second, and more interesting part of the story, is that it might have been prevented. (Not the cream separator part).

Councillor Nichole Posehn, with perhaps more than a passing knowledge of IT (information technology) systems and associated security vulnerabilities, offered the R.M. of Edenwold some advice on how to minimize their risks.

This took the form of her warnings at a couple of committee meetings and at the October 8, 2024 council meeting about the possible danger, and a proposal for a relatively low-cost expert analysis of the R.M.'s systems to try to minimize or prevent the type of losses which ultimately followed.

Her council presentation was preceded, and then followed up with, no fewer than twelve e-mails to administration expressing her concerns and offering fairly detailed advice on


