How to survive annoying relatives this holiday season

Social allergies are a lot like seasonal allergies. They're annoying, exhausting and hard to avoid. They're also especially common around the holidays. That's because the holidays put you at a high risk of exposure. Swap the dander and ragweed for your not-so-favourite acquaintances and relatives and there you have it — a full-blown case of social allergies.

Maybe it's the way your aunt constantly complains about frivolous things. Or perhaps it's how your father-in-law smacks his lips and wipes his mouth with the back of his hand when he eats. Or could it be the way your cousin can't have a conversation without droning on about himself?

All of us have allergies to people whose seemingly inconsequential behaviour irritates us. The emotional and physical symptoms these social allergens produce arise within minutes of exposure, making us want to immediately evacuate the toxic environment.

## THE HOLIDAY SEASON SOCIAL ALLERGY

Like seasonal allergies, social allergies are often inescapable. Triggers include the obligatory gettogethers that come with the holidays. For many, the season is supposed to be a time to recharge our batteries: recover from the unreasonable deadlines, numerous pressures and other demands we face on a daily basis.

Social allergies can interfere with that plan.

Rather than having a few days off to decompress, we spend our time away from work filled with dread, anxiety and exasperation because we have to endure people we are allergic to.

Although we can get out of some noxious social situations, there are others that are almost mandatory. So, what are the social antihistamines that will help us cope?

LIMIT EXPOSURE

One effective way to prevent a social allergic reaction is to limit your exposure. In the same way a person allergic to cats should avoid snuggling up in bed with a pride of domestic felines, a person with social allergies should avoid staying in an environment full of social allergens.

By minimizing the amount of time you are in contact with the allergens, you attack the problem directly, fostering resilience and recovery by reducing your exposure to a hazardous situation.

This means leave early or come late. Have a strategy to restrict the amount of time you spend surrounded by your social allergens. While you are at the gathering, be strategic about the social situations

you place yourself in. When finding a spot at the dinner table, don't sit next to cousin so-and-so or aunt M and definitely don't sit in full view of your lip-smacking father-in-law.

VALIDATE

We have the power to exert some control over many social allergens.

For example, when speaking with a self-centred toxic relative, she's looking for a certain type of reaction from you. In many cases, the wanted reaction is simple: it's support and validation.

While you may want to shut off the stream coming out of auntie's mouth, this will not actually help calm your allergic reaction. But if you spend some time to first provide the validation she seeks, you could potentially satisfy her craving and extinguish the behaviour you find repellent.

### GIVE FEEDBACK

If you can no longer tolerate your father-in-law's eating, consider speaking to him about his eating habits. But remember that conversations not only convey information, they also have implications for relationships and identities.

Make it clear to him that you're speaking to him about this because you love him. And see if you can bring up the topic indirectly so that you don't come across as intrusive. Giving feedback to people often fails to change their behaviour if we're not sensitive about how it might be received.

### **MINDFULNESS**

If giving feedback to your father-in-law doesn't seem like the best idea, you

can instead try practising mindfulness. Mindfulness is a non-judgmental state of present moment awareness.

When social allergens start bothering you, pay attention to your own internal irritation without evaluating it. Don't cling to it and don't push it away. Just follow it.

Watching the ebbs and flows of your experience has a way of putting distance between you and your reactions through a process called reperceiving. Mindfulness won't necessarily prevent the allergen from bothering you, but it will help you control how much it annoys you and how quickly you recover from its effects.

Social allergies can burn you out and change a

relaxing holiday into a stressful test of endurance. To get a boost during holiday time, you need to make sure that you spend your time with people who recharge and revitalize you. Also, mitigate your averse people's reaction to annoying habits. A few simple steps can transform your holiday into one that lets you enjoy a happy, healthy break, instead of having to contend with social allergies.

Celebrate Canada with this heart-healthy fall harvest lasagna

Harvest season in Canada brings savoury favourites and an abundance of fresh produce that's both healthy and full on flavour. Take advantage of

those in-season offerings with a new take on a fall classic:

### Sweet Potato and Crisped Kale Lasagna with Apple and Sausage

Prep time: 50 minutes Cook time: 55 minutes Makes: 8 servings

### **Ingredients:**

- 2 large sweet potatoes, washed and scrubbed
- 2 medium onions, diced
- 2 Granny Smith apple
- 1 bunch kale, washed, stripped and torn up (about 4 cups, or 1 L)
- 5 Italian sausages (500 g), mild or hot



1¼ lbs (560 g) ricotta cheese 1 cup (250 ml) grated parmesan 2 tbsp (30 ml) canola oil, divided 1/4 tsp (1 ml) ground nutmeg 4 cloves of garlic, minced 1 tsp (5 ml) dried sage ½ tsp (2 ml) black pepper canola cooking spray

### **Directions:**

### Lasagna mixture:

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C).
- 2. Pierce one sweet potato with a fork on all sides. Microwave on high until fork-tender, about 8 minutes. Let cool, remove skin, add to a large bowl and mash.
- 3. Add ricotta and nutmeg to the mash and mix thoroughly. Set aside.
- 4. In a large pan over medium-high heat, add 1 tbsp (15 ml) canola oil. Add onion and sauté for 5-7 minutes, until soft. Add garlic and dried sage, cooking for another 1-2 minutes.
- 5. Remove casing from sausages and crumble into pan. Cook with onion mixture for 10-12 minutes, or until cooked through. Add 2 cups (500 ml) of kale and wilt, about 1 minute.
- 6. Remove from heat and set aside.
- 7. Using a mandolin, slice the other sweet potato lengthwise. Slices should be about 1/8" (3 mm) thick. Set aside.
- 8. Quarter the apples and remove cores. Using the mandolin, slice quarters thinly, about 1/8" (3 mm) thick. Set aside.

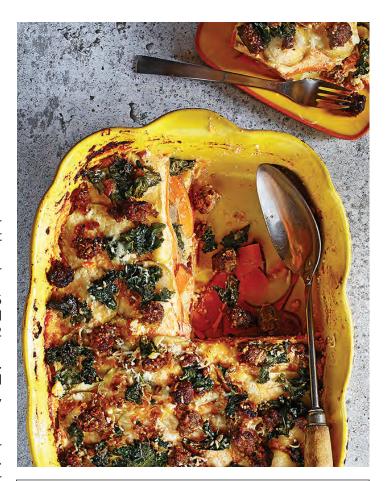
### Assembly and baking:

- 1. Spray a 9 x 13" (23 x 33 cm) baking dish with canola cooking spray.
- 2. Line the bottom of the dish with half the sweet potato slices.
- 3. Top slices with half the ricotta mixture. Spread evenly using a rubber spatula.
- 4. Top ricotta mixture with half the apple slices, in an even layer.
- 5. Spread half the sausage mixture over top and sprinkle with half the parmesan.
- 6. Repeat steps 2 to 4 with remaining ingredients.
- 7. In a small bowl, toss remaining kale with 1 tbsp (15 ml) canola oil. Distribute evenly on top of lasagna.
- 8. Cover with tin foil and bake for 40 minutes. Remove foil and return to oven for 10-15 minutes, or until kale leaves are browned.
- 9. Let cool before serving.

**Tip:** Using canola oil lets you take advantage of its high smoke point to really crisp up the edges of the lasagna for contrast with the tender inside layers.

The difference is that it will now be government-run, rather than privately managed as it was in the past. Emanuel Villa is an 80-bed facility, and all admissions will go through the formal SHA process. I did inquire whether there would be a specialized dementia or Alzheimer's unit, and at this time there are no plans for one.

It is important to note that Emanuel Villa will

serve as a long-term care home for individuals of varying ages who require a higher level and quality of care.

There's not much I can add to flesh out the details of the scheme to defraud the R.M. of Edenwold and the Town of White City to the tune of \$497,000 and \$200,000 respectively. In a joint statement the two municipalities disclosed that a fraudster had electronically impersonated the Wastewater Authority, jointly owned by the two, and had made off with the loot. Of course, there's a criminal investigation underway and efforts are ongoing to recover the money. Will they be successful? Time will tell.

However, there's more to this story. At the R.M.'s council meeting back on October 8th, 2024, councillor Nichole Posehn, a modern-day Cassandra (Google it), suspecting (correctly, as it turns out) that there were I.T. security vulnerabilities, presented a cybersecurity assessment proposal which would see a recognized cybersecurity expert do an audit of the R.M.'s systems at a modest cost of \$3,500. Council rejected her suggestions.

She followed up with numerous e-mails to staff and the Reeve detailing her specific con-

cerns, all of which were ignored. The I.T. committee, of which Posehn had been a member, and which would have been the ideal forum for discussing, well, I.T. stuff and what can go wrong if there is inadequate security, was never convened again after October 8th.

The R.M. issued this statement after Posehn's proposal: "The RM's IT Specialist has already implemented the framework with technical controls reviewed. The RM has funds budgeted for tools for prevention over third-party assessments and for any emergency situations. The roadmap for IT infrastructure is being followed."

To which I would respond. "Oh yeah? How's that working out for you?"

I'm willing to bet that there are a number of people, councillors and staff alike, who are wishing that they had taken councillor Posehn's concerns and recommendations seriously. (insert horse/barn-door analogy here). They were, seemingly, more interested in compiling a dossier of code of ethics charges against her for such heinous activities as lingering at the coffee station, having the temerity to make a motion to amend a council agenda, and suggesting that the R.M. institute a "hire local" campaign. In fact, at the same council meeting at which Posehn sounded the alarm, the council

filed the formal code of ethics complaints against her. Hmmm. Priorities.

\*\*\*\*\*

The proposal for the Greensview high-density rental residential complex in Emerald Park will soon be moving into the Public Hearing phase. It is the considered opinion of your faithful scribe that residents of Emerald Park and White City are nearly unanimously opposed to this development. So it really comes down to our willingness to push back against it.

That means showing up at the public hearing. Watch for the notice of the date; it may already

have been announced by the time you are reading this. Write letters of opposition. Better yet, speak up against the project at the public hearing. Talk to your neighbours. Bring them to the public hearing. It's up to us to convince the councillors who will be voting on the issue to listen to their ratepayers.

Because, as sure as God made little green apples, if we all sit back and let "George" do the heavy lifting for us, the R.M. Council will approve this development.

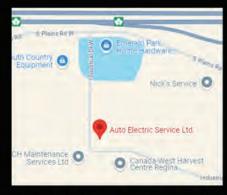

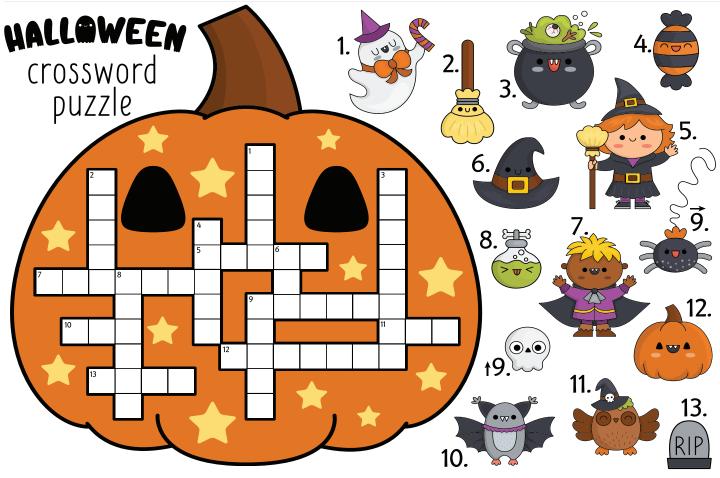
