

Over the past 3 years I've gotten to experience the charm White City has to offer and have had the ability to raise our 2 boys along with my wife Sarah. Introducing:

Brian Fergusson Candidate for Mayor

In choosing to run for re-election, I considered what our Council accomplished, as well as what's still outstanding:

Accomplishments: a) improved communication and resident engagement; b) progress on Annexation; c) significantly improved relationships with the RM and nearby communities; d) initiated a review of the Official Community Plan (OCP) and Zoning Bylaw (ZB); e) started construction in Town Centre; f) implemented a Community Safety Officer program; g) renewed the Splash Park; h) constructed the Bronco Park play structure with ability



features; i) maintained water and sewer rates close to the average of other communities; j) developed the Recreation Centre plan to 'shovel-ready' readiness; and k) maintained property taxes at levels more than competitive with other municipalities.

Yet to Complete: a) getting an annexation decision from the Court of Appeal; b) revamping the governance structure of the wastewater authority; c) achieving rate reductions for water, in spite of the contractual restrictions; d) complete the OCP and ZB reviews; e) construct a high school and an additional elementary school; f) continue development of Town Centre; and g) reduce the Town's debt, most of which has been a result of wastewater treatment expansion to continue the Town's growth.

I believe it's worth noting that an important aspect of being Mayor is the time commitment that's needed to effectively perform the role. In looking back over the past 47 months, I've averaged about 10 hours per week. With calls and emails, preparation time for meetings, etc., that number is closer to 15 hours per week – but that doesn't tell the whole story. There have been several weeks where my duties took 20 or even 30 hours. Many of those hours were breakfast or morning meetings, as well as others throughout the day – sometimes on short notice. When considering candidates, ask yourself who is better able to commit that amount of time as and when necessary – and what happens when that's not possible.

I've posted greater detail about the above (and more) issues on my website and my Facebook page. Please check them out for far more information than space allows here.

Please note that, regardless of whether I'm re-elected this will be my last campaign. I've already decided I won't be running in 2028, and I'm announcing that now to give others time to consider their candidacy, including 'picking my brain' about the role, should they choose to do so.

In closing, I believe I have the skills, knowledge, experience, relationships, and availability to make me the best candidate for Mayor and I ask for your support on November 13. Regardless of the results I'll always be able to look back with the knowledge that I did my job as Mayor to the best of my abilities – and always in the best interests of the community.

Council Summaries

October 1, 2024 - Committee of the Whole

The Committee of the Whole meeting on October 1 was called to order at 4PM. Department reports included Finance; Governance, Legislative Services, Communications, and Protective Services; and Community Planning and Development. Additionally, the Committee approved recommended appointments for the Recreation Advisory Committee to Council and moved that that the Terms of Reference be amended to increase the membership from five community members to eight community members. The Committee also approved a Municipal Donation, Grant and Sponsorship application, and directed Administration to review the eligibility section of, and bring forward options for consideration at the next Committee meeting.

October 15, 2024 - Committee of the Whole

The October 15, 2024 Committee of the Whole meeting included several key items. A delegation from the White Butte RCMP Detachment provided an update on RCMP activities and statistics for June through September 2024, with discussions covering specific incidents, home security camera registry program, RCMP staffing changes, and a brief comment on the student altercations at Greenall High School. The Consent Agenda, which included previous meeting minutes, correspondence from the Indian Head District Hospital Foundation, and accounts and payroll, was approved following a brief clarification. Department reports covered various updates: Business Operations discussed IT strategy, licensing, Occupational Health and Safety committee meetings, and business continuity planning; Parks, Recreation, and Culture highlighted upcoming events, ongoing volunteer strategy, and outdoor rink plans; and Public Works Development focused on infrastructure projects and resident services.

Corporate items included a recommendation to Council for a Donation, Grant, and Sponsorship Policy amendment. Under community items, a report on recreation and facility rental fees was discussed. The Committee referred the report back to Administration for further research and for consultation with the Recreation Advisory Committee. Lastly, a Community Standards Bylaw amendment, covering landscaping standards and timing. The Committee recommended the amendment to Council for adoption.

October 15, 2024 - Regular Council Meeting

The Regular Council Meeting on October 15, 2024, was called to order at 7 PM. The Consent Agenda, which included previous meeting minutes and the ratification of accounts and payroll. The Town Manager provided a verbal report was presented. Council approved the appointments to the Recreation Advisory Committee and reviewed a Long-Term Borrowing Bylaw, which received two readings and was adopted without additional discussion. During the roundtable, updates were provided on topics including the renaming of the White City Museum to the White Butte Museum, upcoming municipal elections, progress on the Emerald Ridge playground, and resident inquiries.

Public Works

Upcoming Projects

The Public Works Team is busy with wrapping up fall projects and with seasonal preparations to ensure the community is ready for the colder months. Here's what's happening and few important reminders for residents:

Current Projects:

- Ongoing crack sealing on roadways and pathways.
- Culvert marking is underway to prepare for spring drainage.
- Preparing snow equipment for the upcoming winter season.
- Preparations are also being made for the outdoor rink.

Resident Reminders:

- <u>Sewer Cleanouts:</u> Please inspect your driveway's sewer clean outs to ensure all clean outs are covered, with no broken or missing sewer caps. If your sewer cap is damaged, the Town is not responsible for costs associated with thawing frozen sewer lines.
- <u>Mark Road Edges:</u> Mark the boundaries where your grass meets the asphalt to help prevent any damage from snowplows.
- <u>Garbage/Recycle Bin Placement:</u> Ensure that garbage and recycling bins are placed on your property, not on the road. This will allow snowplows to clear the street without obstruction. Loraas trucks maintain a 9-foot reach, so bins can easily be collected from your driveway.
- <u>Yard Tidying:</u> As winter approaches, keeping your yard free of debris, garbage, and clutter, including tree branches, is crucial to avoid attracting vermin and pests to your property as they seek shelter during the cold winter months.

WCFD Open House

The White City Fire Department hosted their annual Open House on the evening of October 8, welcoming community members to an engaging and informative event. Attendees had the opportunity to meet their local firefighters and first responders, explore the fire station, and learn about the important work the department does to keep our community safe.

The Fire Department strives not only to provide first-class fire protection and medical response, but also to support fire prevention, safety education, and supporting emergency and disaster management planning. In addition to meeting the department, and exploring the fire hall, attendees enjoyed refreshments and a hotdog or two. The White City Fire Department extends a big thank you to everyone who attended and looks forward to continuing to serve White City and the surrounding areas.
